Course Description

This course focuses on the money side of macroeconomics. The course includes classes dealing with the structure of financial markets and instruments traded on the financial market. The main part is devoted to the central bank and monetary policy as well as the review of current empirical research country cases and the analysis of inflation and unemployment.

Course Objectives

The purpose of this course is to introduce you to the major theoretical issues in monetary (and macro) economics that generate implications for policy decisions and policy assessment relating to interest rates, prices, output, and unemployment. The course will address the structure of the financial markets and instruments as well as the main structural features and regulations with implications for the actual monetary policy implementation. Also, the course will analyze actual monetary policy implementation and related challenges through country cases. Finally, a group assignment will allow students to analyze and present a country case to the class.

Prerequisite: Consent of instructor. MSPE Graduate Student Standing.

The course grade will be determined by your performance on the following:

Group assignment: 20% Mid-term: 30% Final Exam: 30% Assignments: 10% for each exam.
